PRESIDENTS COLUMN

GEOHERITAGE

On Heritage Day (24 September) South Africans are encouraged to celebrate their culture and the diversity of their beliefs and traditions, in the wider context of a nation that belongs to all its people. The first Heritage Day was celebrated in 1995 and in the early 2000's National Braai Day started gaining momentum as a way to celebrate South Africa's culinary tradition of gathering round a fire to cook.

In South Africa, we have an especially rich heritage of natural features of geological significance – typically celebrated by various Geoheritage organisations. But more than that, we have a rich heritage of geological luminaries, Alex du Toit, Hans Merensky, Andrew Geddes-Bain, George Corstophine, George Stowe, to name but a few, who first put South African geoscience front-and-centre on the global stage (Rogers, 1937).

Just as important as the historical figures, however, is the role that has been played by ordinary geologists in our mining industry. And on this Heritage Day, I would like to pay tribute in terms of:

- The effort of both academic and industry geologists in determining that the Wits Basin was a far bigger entity than initially thought.
- The application of rational scientific thinking plus early-stage geophysics between the 1930's and 1950's leading to the discovery, of four major goldfields and the establishment of more than 25 gold mines.
- The exploration and prospecting strategies that led to the discovery and exploitation of numerous platinum, base-metal, coal and diamond mines, making South Africa one of leading mining countries in the world and the basis that this laid for major economic development post WW2.

Even in these times of Covid-19, the minerals industry has been a pillar of support to the South African economy. In April 2020, after the first full month of lockdown, total mining production fell by more than 47% year-on-year (Basquill, 2020).

However, despite mining GDP falling by 4%, the industry managed to sustain itself through the COVID-19 pandemic somewhat better than might have been expected at the beginning of the lockdown (Minerals Council of South Africa, 2021).......


