Happy 125th Birthday, GSSA

The official "founding" of the GSSA on 4th February 1895, was prompted by the discovery of Wits gold in 1886, which also coincides with the founding of Johannesburg. This discovery caused the scientific and technical centre of gravity to shift from Kimberley to Johannesburg and therefore the concentration of the geological, financial and the greater mining fraternity in Johannesburg, which was in its infancy.

The founding meeting was held at the then Transvaal Chamber of Mines in Market Street, Johannesburg and consisted of the following Founding Council:

Honorary President: Lionel Phillips

Honorary Vice President: Prof. Thomas Rupert Jones Honorary Vice President: Dr. William Guybon Atherstone

The first elected President was Dr Hugh Exton and David Draper was elected as the secretary and treasurer. Arthur Robert Sawyer and John Ballot were elected as Vice Presidents. The remainder of the 1895 Council consisted of 20 distinguished members. A constitution, based on the Geological Society of London, was adopted. We will share the Transactions from the inaugural address by Dr. Exton held in 1895 with the membership soon.

The Council Members consisted of the who's who of the South African geologists at the time and we are grateful for the learned society they have formed. South Africa has a rich mining history that we can all be proud of and this evolution continues in the current day and age of the so-called 4th Industrial Revolution.

During this year, we will celebrate the 125th year through various events including the 2020 Geocongress, meetings events and branch events. I appeal to the membership to get involved in 2020 to celebrate this evolution with us.

Introduction to the SAMOG Code 11 March 2020



This short course by Peter Dekker, SAMOG Committee Chairperson, aims to clarify the difference between internal (private) and public reporting of hydrocarbon quantities and asset value in the petroleum industry. Each report is aimed to satisfy different stakeholder requirements and assist in making investment decisions either by the reporting entity's management or by external investors.

In this course we will focus on three reporting standards for three different stakeholder groups and show how they are related to each other. The question will be raised if we can have one standard that fits all?

THE BOOK

PAYMENT OF SACNASP FEES

SACNASP Invoices are distributed annually. These will be raised mid Feb and distributed over a 2-week period. Should you not receive yours by end February, please contact Joey Fourie at joey@sacnasp.org.za.

SACNASP recommends payment via the new online scientist portal using the following link https://portal.sacnasp.org.za/login . Your password will be your ID / Passport number (unless already amended by you). Once logged into the Dashboard you can:

- Download your current certificate of registration (which also shows when your annual registration expires);
- See your outstanding balance. Click on "Manage account" and "Proceed to Payfast" in order to settle your outstanding balance. Following online payment via Payfast in full, you will be able to download a registration certificate. SACNASP strongly recommends payment via the online Scientist Portal and not directly into their bank account, as this may result in your payment being delayed.
